Course Description

This reading course in Theoretical Philosophy focuses on John Dewey's 1929 Gifford Lectures, "The Quest for Certainty."

Course Requirements

There are two requirements for the course: (i) in-class participation; (ii) one short (\sim 1000 word) philosophical essay. All assignments are to be completed in English.

- 1. *In-class participation*: You will be evaluated by the quality, rather than quantity, of your contributions to class discussion.
- 2. *Short paper*: You are required to write one short philosophical essay for the course that is **no longer than 1000 words**. You will be penalized for going over this limit. This word limit is designed to help you to economize your writing, since you *only* have 1000 words with which to make a clear argument and substantive philosophical point. A good rule of thumb for writing a successful short essay is to think of a paper that you would currently attempt to write in 1500 words, then revise that essay to fit within the 1000 word limit.
